On a better footing we have had 2 clubs enquire about joining the AGA which they are now in the process of discussing with their parent clubs. Keeping everything crossed hopefully some of the clubs will avert from disbanding a few of the latest clubs and see that we can be a very valued section in any club.

Your AGA Council committee will continue to support and help in any way it can to ensure we try and maintain our clubs throughout the country and keep the AGA as strong as possible in the coming years. Once again I would like to remind every club and its members that AGA/EG fees MUST be paid on time. Please speak to your Secretary/Treasurer to make sure the payments are on time, If your clubs do not pay on time this is the route we now have to take as we have to meet EG deadline payments, so non payment could mean your clubs' Handicaps/insurance and AGA membership will be suspended until such time as they are paid. It is difficult to keep on top of this and it is the same time every year. It is only paid once a year, so please get organised and pay on time. Please use the website to see everything that is going on. The renewal dates are always posted on there.

I hope the County Scratch League will take place again next year as it was most disappointing not to have it take place this year. As from 2023 Sussex have now asked to join Kent so there will be 4 teams next year so, I hope to have 4 willing Captains and their teams and sort out the games. Maybe something can be discussed at the AGA AGM in January 2023.

After our Centenary in August, which was a fantastic celebration of our 100 years, JH Taylor would have been so proud of the way it was carried out and I am sure everyone who attended had an enjoyable day. MINUTES OF THE 57th AGM OF THE SURREY ARTISAN GOLF UNION HELD AT WALTON HEATH ARTISAN GOLF CLUB ON TUESDAY 18TH OCTOBER 2022

Previous Minutes

The Minutes of the previous meeting were read by Les Sharp.

Minutes proposed by Rob Barnes seconded by Chris Massey and carried unanimously.

Matters Arising

There were no matters arising.

Chairman

Robert welcomed everyone to the meeting and stated that he had very little to report.

He thanked the officers and committee for their work during the year.

After tonight he is standing down as Surrey chairman and said that Rob Barnes has, subject to a vote later, offered to take on the role.

Secretary

Les thanked the committee. Special mention to Rob Barnes and Wayne Thorn who run the Singles and Foursomes competitions respectively. Wayne has agreed to continue to run the foursomes although he is no longer affiliated to an artisan club.

Canteloupe have requested to join our Union. They were accepted 5 years ago, but delayed entry because they were trying to re-establish the Sussex Union. However, they have now paid their subscription and entered two teams in the Sevens. Dave Heckford attended the AGM on their behalf.

The championships at Betchworth Park were well attended. 44 players participated and the club looked after us very well. Winners were; Scratch – Nigel Watson (Betchworth), Senior – Graham Dorward (RMS) and Junior – Graeme Turpin (St. Georges Hill).

Next year's Surrey championships will be held at Betchworth Park on 3rd July 2023. A full day at Betchworth is £121. They have offered us a discounted rate of £90. However, once again, we can offer this to our clubs for £70 per person, with one place already paid in your club's subscription.

Communication is the key to a successful Artisan movement. Please ensure that all changes to your club's administration are reported to Les in a timely manner. Rob Barnes is setting up a WhatsApp group for Artisan club members to keep other members informed of what's going on at their club.

He thanked all clubs for their support.

A special claret jug was given, to Doug Lumsden for his part Of serving many, many years with artisan golf right at the heart Then Karl, the Artisan Captain gave his speech to everyone Thanking each and all who have taken part and for the help that had been done To run the very successful day, and to thank JH Taylor too Who formalised the association to make golf available to you His speech was very moving; he's so honoured to be a part Of the artisan golfing movement and spoke right from the heart And in response, from England Golf, Jeremy Tomlinson replied On behalf of all the guests that were there with words that were justified A centenary plate was given and received with thanks and pride Knowing it is a rare occurrence and the honour that's implied. It will be a very memorable day; all felt honoured to be there It was clear from the camaraderie that artisans really care.

A Short History of the Artisan Golfer's Association

The Artisan Golfers' Association had its official birth in a room in the Fleet Street Hotel called, Anderton on a July evening in 1921 instigated by the famous professional golfer of the times, JH Taylor together with FG Hawtree and supported by Lord Riddell and Jim Wilks of Flackwell Heath.

The prototypes of artisan golf, by playing golf in off peak times, are Northam at Royal North Devon and Cantelupe at Royal Ashdown Forest followed by working men's clubs in the North East; Ryton & Newcastle and then more followed in Norfolk. None had the word 'artisan' in their title. This appeared for the first time with the formation of a club called Bulwell Forest and then Malvern. At the end of Queen Victoria's reign there were approximately a dozen clubs scattered around the country.

As the popularity of golf increased and more clubs were formed it became necessary to form an organisation. It was decided that the organisation be called The Artisan Golfers' Association with the object of uniting the various artisan and working men's clubs and to encourage and help in the formation of new clubs. The first subscription was £1. It was divided into sectors: Southern, Midland, Northern, Western, Eastern & Wales. At its peak there were over 200 clubs.

The AGM is to be held each year in the second week of December and it was agreed at a meeting in 1922 to write to all artisan golf clubs to encourage them to affiliate to the AGA and offer a Challenge Trophy for competition to all members.

In August 1936 an agreement was made that JH Taylor & FG Hawtree be appointed Trustees of the Artisan Golfers' Association.

In December 1937 an agreement was reached between the AGA and National Public Golf Courses and the English Golf Union regarding representatives to the executive of that Union.

JH Taylor was a co-founder and the first chairman of the British Professional Golfers' Association and was very influential with the Artisan Golfers' Association and was appointed as Vice President and acted as chairman at many of the meetings until the time he was President in 1941. He served in that office until 1963; 42 years of remarkable service.

At a meeting of the interim council of the AGA held on 16 October 1923 JH Taylor proposed that WJ Gardner of Flackwell Heath be appointed honorary assistant secretary of the Association. An office held until he retired in 1966 fulfilling his AGA duties for 43 years, including 30 years as secretary taking over from FG Hawtree in 1936. He was known as 'Mr Artisan Golf'.

John Henry Taylor

JH Taylor took a leading part in the formation of the Artisan Golfers' Association and the National Association of Public Golf Courses, so democratising a sport that in his early days was largely a preserve of the wealthy. Although he was five times Open Champion, he was one of the founding fathers at Northam in 1888 and four years later helped to form an artisan club at Royal Ashdown Forest, Cantelupe. He also helped to start the Professional Golfers' Association.

It was typical that he should prize as highly as any of his possessions (and at his home are scores of mementoes of his career) a desk that was the gift of the Artisans' Clubs of Great Britain, a tribute to his work for them.

The prizes were donated by the Association's constant friend, The News of the World. It was held at Walton Heath in 1922. It was a one day event, but as the association quickly grew, it became a two day event and eventually a three day event after the WW2.

First Royal Patronage

In 1935, the Prince of Wales (later King Edward VIII) was the first Royal Patron. He was succeeded by King George VI and then our late Queen Elizabeth II followed by our current Patron, Sir Michael Bonallack
